A humorous narrative chapter book written by Teena Raffa-Mulligan and illustrated by Craig Smith. Great Grandma Em doesn't get upset when Great Grandpop Alfred teases her about her wrinkles. But when she hears that her friend, Amelia, is coming to visit, she wants to look young again.

Comprehension strategy focus

Figurative Language: Good readers think as they read. They ask and answer questions to help them focus and to build better understanding. Good readers identify figures of speech and interpret their meaning and effectiveness in a text. Looking for key words in the questions and in the text will help students find the right answers.

The two worksheets for this lesson reinforce critical literacy comprehension skills by asking students to identify and interpret figurative language in a text.

Online assessment

- Students complete a 16 question comprehension quiz. The quiz tests literal, inferential, vocabulary and usage, text analysis and critical literacy comprehension skills. Example questions are:
 - Which words best describe Tessa?
 - Who believes that fruit and vegetable juice is good for hair?
 - Who is telling the story?
