## **Figurative Language**

Figurative language is language that moves away from the straightforward, literal interpretation of words. Similes and metaphors are figures of speech that compare one thing to something unlike itself by using the words *like* or *as*. Metaphors make a more direct comparison. They do not contain the words *like* or *as*.
